



There were no apologies to hand. It was noted that Member Presland was on leave of absence.

OM12.1 Minutes of Meeting No. O11 of the Omokoroa Community Board held on 13 March 2018

The Board considered the minutes of OM12 of the Omokoroa Community Board held on 13 March 2018 as circulated with the agenda.

OM12.2 Chairperson's Report

The Board considered a report from the Chairperson dated 5 April 2018 as circulated with the agenda.

OM12.2.1 Future Focus Meeting - The Omokoroa Intersection and State Highway Two

The Chairperson noted that the Draft Regional Land Transport Plan had come out before the Draft Government Strategy Transport Plan and it was important that the Northern Corridor proposal for State Highway Two and the Omokoroa intersection treatment proposal did not fall into any cracks at this stage.

Before the change in government the proposed works on State Highway Two northern corridor and the Omokoroa intersection were all but ready to go out to tender. At the moment under the new government, all proposed works were on hold. The Western Bay of Plenty District Council would be making a submission to the Government Policy Statement.

The Bay of Plenty Regional Transport Committee would be deliberating on submissions to the Draft Regional Transport Committee on 8 May 2018. Submission feedback would also be included in the Regional Transport Plan submission to the Government. The Government Draft Policy Statement on the state highway investment programme would be released in August 2018.

OM12.2.2 Open Air Art Group - Anchor Stone

The Chairperson advised that he had had the opportunity to see the Anchor Stone sculpture in its current state as a work in progress and met with the sculptor. The finished sculpture, with incorporated Māori designs would be stunning when finally in place outside the Omokoroa Boat Club.

OM12.2.3 Access Way to Reserve Area Beside the Omokoroa Bowling Club

The Reserves and Facilities Officer provided answers to the queries raised by Anne Sandel at the last Community Board Meeting (OM11) about anti-social behaviours in the reserve area adjacent to the Omokoroa Bowling Club on Hamurana Road, Omokoroa. A copy of the reply would be forwarded to Ms Sandel.

OM12.2.4 Omokoroa Road Works - Contractor Traffic Management and Consideration

A Board member raised concerns regarding contractor behaviour and consideration whilst working on Omokoroa Road. There had been various traffic hold-ups and issues with traffic management when an influx of 600+ children had come into Omokoroa to use the playing fields for regular sports games.

Personnel running the sports fixtures needed to make sure they were booked through the Council and the Council staff would then advise the contractors of the programmed events. From now and during the winter the junior soccer season there would mean a regular influx of traffic into the area for Saturday morning football and the roading contractors needed to be aware of this — as well as specific training nights during the week that may potentially create high volume traffic congestion.

The Transportation Manager advised that he would speak to the Roading Construction managers to ensure they were notified of the pending events that would result in high traffic volumes to the main road into and out of Omokoroa.

OM12.2.5 Submission to the Regional Transport Committee

Councillor Murray-Benge congratulated the Chairperson on his submission to the Regional Land Transport Committee, which was well researched and clearly summarised the issues relating to the State Highway Two Waihi to Tauranga highway including safety and capacity improvements between Te Puna and Omokoroa and safety improvements between Omokoroa and Waihi and the Katikati bypass.

OM12.2.6 Omokoroa Community Board Submission to the Long Term Plan

The Chairperson advised that he had presented the Omokoroa Community Board submission to the 2018-2028 Long Term Plan to Council on 19 April 2018.

OM12.2.7 Community Matching Fund

The Board was advised of the forthcoming Community Matching Fund application process that opened on 12 June through to 12 July 2018. Community Groups would be encouraged to be aware of the opportunity to put forward an application.

OM12.3 Councillor's Report

The Board considered a report from the Councillor Palmer dated 10 April 2018 as circulated with the agenda.

OM12.3.1 Kaimai Reserve Management Plan

Councillor Palmer advised that considerations relating to the Precious Reserve within the Kaimai Reserve Management had been withdrawn at this time.

A draft concept plan for the Omokoroa Domain was expected to be presented in the near future.

OM12.3.2 Long Term Plan Update

Councillor Palmer noted that, while the Boards submission to the Long Term Plan had been submitted, he quoted a number of projects that were listed in the Kaimai Ward Projects List within the Long Term Plan advising that if there was to be any change to priorities or funding from the Boards point of view these needed to be advised before the 4 May.

The final listed projects and allocated funding may be subject to some change when the Long Term Plan would be adopted on 28 June 2018.

The Chairperson advised that the recently adopted Omokoroa Community Plan outlined what the community wanted and the priority of those projects was yet to be confirmed.

OM12.4 Infrastructure Services Report Omokoroa - April 2018

The Board considered a report from Deputy Chief Executive dated 9 April 2018 as circulated with the agenda.

OM12.4.1 Te Puna Wastewater Scheme

Comment was made that the Te Puna Wastewater scheme project had been a successful Council project with the affected property owners informed along the way from start to finish.

OM12.4.2 Omokoroa Sportsground Playground

The Board received a copy of the draft Concept Plan of the playground to be constructed on the Omokoroa Sportsground, which had been circulated for community feedback. It was advised that the project may be split into two separate stages so that external funding can be obtained in which case the project may extend into 2018/19.

The Board noted that consideration must be given to the availability of parking in the immediate area in both the short and long term in association with the Western Avenue and Omokoroa Road proposed upgrade. The slope of the proposed playground site was also a concern relating to user safety.

OM12.4.3 Omokoroa Cell Phone Tower Construction

The Board was advised that the construction of a cell phone tower at Omokoroa would commence in the first half of 2018.

OM12.4.4 Omokoroa Road Construction

The Transportation Manager provided a verbal update to the summary provided within the Infrastructure Services Report.

OM12.4.5 Application to Tourism Infrastructure Fund

The Tourism Infrastructure Fund had been established "to protect and enhance New Zealand's reputation domestically and internationally by supporting robust infrastructure which in turn contributed to quality experiences for visitors and maintained the social licences for the sector to operate." A question was asked if an application to the Tourism Infrastructure Fund to provide financial support for local tourism-related infrastructure being local walkways and cycleways had been submitted.

It was felt that the ongoing development of the district walkways and cycleways were worthy of an application being submitted to this funding source.

Chairperson's Report – June 2018

1. Domain and Esplanade Area

The Omokoroa Community Plan includes the following action:

Action 35: "Ensure recreational use of the esplanade and Domain meets the needs of the growing population. The esplanade, Domain and boat ramp area should be developed to ensure environmental protection and accommodate boating, junior sailing, swimming, recreational and commercial activities including management of parking and boat trailer congestion."

Council already has a reserve management plan in place for the Domain which sets out the key purpose and vision for the reserve.

At open days held last year, Council received a lot of feedback on what people want to see happen with the Domain / boat ramp / esplanade. It is an area that is treasured by the community – but some are concerned with how it will cater for the growth in the area, and there are current issues with it being congested at certain times.

To find out more about how the area is being used, cameras have been installed. These monitor use of the area and give a good picture of when it's busy and when it's quiet, and where conflicts of use are happening. User surveys have also been carried out at both the Domain and boat ramp. Sixty users were interviewed over 2 days.

By the date of this meeting, the initial stakeholder meeting will have been held (30 May) to get input into developing a master plan for the area.

The purpose of the workshop was to get community input to build a master plan for the development of the Domain and Esplanade area. The next actions are:

July - public open days in July to get wider feedback, September - Council to sign off on the Plan...ready to get under way with some actions.

2. Omokoroa Road upgrade end in sight

The Omokoroa Road upgrade has been an exceptionally complex project due to weather delays, shortage of construction crews, roundabout and intersection builds, developer requests and underground installation of multi-utility services.

However most of the road's new pavement is expected to be completed in June. The \$12.9 million project for which physical works began early in 2017, also hit setbacks with the discovery of multiple archaeological sites and the removal of old, unused asbestos watermain pipes that needed specialist handling and disposal.

Underground services installed during the construction have included new water mains, gravity sewer main, stormwater main, new road culverts, communications and power cables, broadband fibre optic cabling and the relocation of sections of the Omokoroa sewer transfer main.

Works will continue until September on installing the stormwater main connection into the Kaimai Views special housing area; development of the park-n-ride near the Prole Road intersection; construction of a cycleway from SH2 to the fire station and installation of an additional sewer main to the wastewater transfer station.

Community Installed Access.

An access way that is not something either Westlink or Reserves have installed or maintained has been created adjacent to #34 Harbour View Rd, Omokoroa. The steps appear to have been constructed and put in place by the locals. They are steep steps with a rope handhold that are currently in an unsafe condition.

It was not visible in 2009 video but a post can be seen in the 2013 video so they are maybe about 5 years old. If it were an official structure it would be maintained by Reserves as it provides a path between the road and the sea.

We could also provide a new structure but since this will end up being maintained by Reserves it might make more sense to have them build it.



Options are to remove or provide and maintain a new, safe, structure.

Staff Comment:

The Reserves and Facilities Manager has advised that the steps lead directly onto private property. On this basis, Council should not be considering upgrading the steps. If the Community Board want to see access to the Domain near this point then a site specific design would need to be prepared. The Board may wish to consider requesting an options report with costs for the next Board meeting in July.

Annual General Meeting 2018

Chairman's Report for the period ending 31 March 2018

The Group is now in its eleventh year of operation. The committee has met five times throughout the year to manage the affairs and facilitate the running of the Omokoroa Community Policing Group. The resignations of Helen Hoff, Dave and Helen Woodhouse and the death of Merv Richards meant the committee used its right to co-opt new committee members, Steve Ingall, Cathy Taylor and Lynda Middleton. I would like to acknowledge the work and time that Merv put into the Group's activities. Our group endeavours to foster a culture of safety, care, security and the identification and control of anti-social behaviour and crime in the community. It also endeavours to encourage communication within street communities with neighbours looking after neighbours. Incidences of antisocial behaviour within our community are pretty much static although in recent months the number of burglaries has increased, particularly at new house building sites. It is my belief that as Omokoroa grows our role will become more important. Again this year the OCPG Trust won the Trust Power Communities Health and Wellbeing Award.

All four of our activities rely on the support of the NZ Police and we had good support from our Community Constable, Senior Constable Paul Wrigley.

Our Neighbourhood Support Coordinator Glen Whittaker with the assistance of Cathy Taylor and Lynda Middleton has undertaken to refresh the Omokoroa system. With the increase in new housing areas and the general movement both in and out of Omokoroa new groups and street coordinators will need to be established.

The Police Information Centre continues to be an effective point of contact for community members to meet our Police Representatives and to report incidences or concerns. It is surprising as to how many contacts are made. The volunteer numbers sit at 15 and are well coordinated by Carol Dodd. I also wish to acknowledge the help and support given by the library staff and the WBOP District Council at the PIC.

The Community Patrol continues to function effectively as an operation. It received three Awards from the Bay Of Plenty CPNZ Committee. (Display awards)The police expectation of community patrols is growing and a number of our patrollers have attended extra training with police and it would appear that all have enjoyed it. Patroller numbers have dropped down to around 80 and it is likely the new committee will have to run a recruiting drive to



increase these numbers. I ask that patrollers stick to their training and maintain a high level of observation. Health and Safety must always be to the fore and I would remind all volunteers that they must take all reasonable care for their own health and safety. I wish to thank Rex Martin for his continued support in maintaining the Patrol vehicle and for the team at the Country Estate for allowing us to house the vehicle there.

There has been very little graffiti to deal with this year although the toilet blocks down on the foreshore reserve and Western Ave. continues to be targeted on a regular basis. Fortunately we have members who walk these area regularly and report it.

The effectiveness of our group depends on the support we receive from our partners and backers and so the committee would like to thank the following people and organisations for their ongoing support, the WBOP District Council through the Community Board and CEO, the NZ Police, particularly Senior Constable Paul Wrigley, Shirley Vincent from CPNZ and Keith Herbert for his assistants helping with the balance sheet and financial review.

Our Secretary/Treasurer, Bill Jacob, should be congratulated on the presentation of the financial report and Carol Dodd for her continued work in obtaining operating finances for the group. We have been fortunate to have received funding from WBOPDC, 1st National Real Estate, Lions, Trust Power and The Centre. Every year we have to seek funding wherever we can I would ask that if any of you have knowledge of any business of organisation that may assist us to this end please let the committee know. We find ourselves in a reasonably sound financial position.

A big thank you to all of our volunteers for the effort you have put in this year as the OCPG continues to provide the community with the security and safety they enjoy.

Finally, a big thank you to the committee and all of you that have assisted through the year. As I commented last year, the group is unlikely to fail due to any shortage of volunteers for street coordinators, PIC or patrollers, but unless we can attract people prepared to come on to the committee to take up key positions there may be future problems in maintaining the group. Our constitution says we must have a Chairman and because we are affiliated to CPNZ we must have a patrol coordinator. Some of the current committee members have indicated that they would be standing down having been on the committee since the group's inception nearly 11 years ago.

"In November 2017, the majority of councillors (9 for, 3 against) voted to establish one or more Māori wards as part of a six yearly representation review that legally requires Council to consider Māori representation. Consequently, a valid independent petition from over 5% of Western Bay District electors who opposed the move was handed to Council in February 2018, requiring a poll. As a result, a poll, which involved voting papers being sent to all eligible electors on both the General and Māori Parliamentary Electoral Rolls, opened on Friday 27 April and closed at midday Saturday 19 May.

Results of a binding poll show Western Bay electors have voted against Māori representation around the Council table.

Voter turnout was around 40% of eligible electors 21.5% of electors who voted were for Māori wards 78.2% of electors who voted were against Māori wards

Mayor Garry Webber says he accepts the result. "In announcing its decision in November last year Council acknowledged that not everyone would agree. We were also clear that due process, which included the call for a poll, would be followed and the result of that process respected. Today's result, which is binding for the 2019 and 2022 elections, is clear so it's time for Council to move on with the rest of the representation review."

Final results will be available on Monday 21 May, once all valid special votes have been counted. The official public notice of final results will be appear in papers on Wednesday 23 May.


2.1 Omokoroa to Tauranga Cycleway

Section 1: Omokoroa Boat Ramp to Tinopai Reserve - there has been significant delay with delivery of timber to construct 120m of boardwalk. The latest delivery estimate from the mill is 23 May - construction can be expected to begin asap after this date. Note that when construction begins, this section will be closed to the public. Signage will be in place to detour users via Tinopai Drive. The remainder of this section is complete.

Section 3:

Lynley Park to railway - No change from the last report. - The Archaeological Authority application to Heritage NZ for construction of a small section of the cycleway over the Mangiwhai Pa has now been lodged. The timing of this affects the construction of this section. In the meantime, users will be required to follow the local street network to connect to other completed sections.

Section 4:

Tamihana Park to Kiwirail Bridge – License to occupy application paperwork has been concluded inclding license fees. Final construction surfacing for this section will begin once permit to enter authorisation has been received. The completion of this section will be coordinated with the Plummers Point section to Huharua Park s that a route destination is enabled.

Section 5:

Bridge across Mangawhai inlet - construction will be complete minus the sourthern bridge approach by Friday 25 May. NOTE: Once this bridge is finished, the track will remain closed until the cycleway connection with Huharua Park is in place.

Section 6:

Plummers Point trail from bridge to Huarua Park. Detailed design has been completed. Construction will begin as soon as archaeological authority and resource consent has been obtained.

2.2 Omokoroa Sportsground Playground

Tenders for the supply of playground equipment close on Friday, 19 May and will be evaluated by the Project Team the following week. It is expected that project will be split into two separate stages so that external funding can be obtained, in which case the project may extend into 2018/19.

2.3 Omokoroa Sports Ground - Tennis Courts 3 and 4

The courts (including synthetic turf surfacing) have been completed and are being played on. The volley wall, turf surface, and floodlights are the responsibility of the tennis club.

2.4 Omokoroa Ferry to Opureora/Matakana Island – Facilities Upgrade

The construction of a new weather shelter and seating for installation on the new concrete hardstand adjoining the ramp and road has started and will be completed before the end of May.

OPUREORA JETTY RENEWAL: The final concept design has been endorsed by the Matakana Community and a report is being prepared for Council adoption. Construction is scheduled for the next financial year subject to the normal tendering and approvals process.

2.5 Omokoroa Slips

Complex and frustrating issues remain for affected homeowners and are yet unresolved.

A local member of parliament is now taking an interest.

Council has been approached by the owner of No. 69 Omokoroa Road seeking a repair to a major slip on the seaward side of his property. During the storms of April 2017, the slip fell from a steep bank on the property and closed Council's walkway below. Staff are working with the owner's consultant to follow a process enabling a satisfactory repair to be made.

2.6 Damaged walkway reserve land - Ruamoana Place to Bramley Drive As at 17 May 2018: Two tenders were received and rejected as both prices far exceeded the budget and engineers' estimate.

Resource Consents have been received from both Councils.

The works have now been split into smaller focused packages and negotiations with selected contractors commenced. Earthworks have now started, although progress will be constrained by weather.

3. Strategic Property

3.1 Omokoroa Cell Phone Tower

Construction has commenced on the cell phone tower and whilst completion date is unknown it is anticipated construction would be completed by the end of June 2018.

3.2 Kaimai Views - Sales Update

Seven dwellings are in various stages of completion and consent has been applied for, for a further six dwellings.

Stage 3 of the development is now open to prospective purchasers.

Earthworks on the land set aside for the HAF pilot are almost complete but given we are beyond the earthwork season, will only be completed in the early stages of the next earthwork season.

4. Development Engineering and Projects

4.1 Omokoroa Industrial Road - Investigation / Design

Scoping for design and construction has been confirmed. Currently briefing selected consultants to tender for the investigation and design of the project.

4.2 Omokoroa Industrial Road -Stormwater detention pond

Scoping for design and construction has been confirmed. Currently briefing selected consultants to tender for the investigation and design of the project.

5. Emergency Management

5.1 Training

Ongoing regular meetings with WBOPDC EOC roster staff to discuss their role and provide them with information and resources to further develop their skills and understanding.

5.2 Coming up

Exercise Ruapehu II: A training exercise for the Incident Management Team at the Western Zone Emergency Operations Centre is planned for 29 June 2018. This three hour facilitated desktop discussion will focus on responding to a volcanic ash fall event.

The three key objectives for the exercise are:

- To introduce the Checklist Compendium which we have developed over the past year in response to demand for more structured guidance to event management;
- To discuss the key principles of successful function team management;
- To integrate these two objectives, through exercising an IMT meeting and the development of an Incident Action Plan.

Roading

6.1 Omokoroa Road Construction - State Highway to Railway

The Omokoroa Road upgrade has been an exceptionally complex project due to weather delays, shortage of construction crews, roundabout and intersection builds, adjoining developer requests and the construction of multiple underground services with different utility authority ownership.

However, most of the road's new pavement is expected to be completed in June 2018.

The \$12.9 million project, with the physical works beginning early in 2017 also hit setbacks with the discovery of multiple archaeological sites and removal of redundant asbestos water main pipes requiring specialist handling and disposal.

Underground services installed during the construction have included new water mains, a new gravity sewer main, a new storm water main, new road culverts, communications and power cables, Ultrafast broadband fibre optic cabling and the relocation of sections of the Omokoroa sewer transfer main.

Works will continue until September 2018 on installing the storm water main connection into the Kaimai Views Special Housing Area; development of the park-n-ride near the Prole Road intersection; construction of a cycleway from SH2 to the fire station and installation of an additional sewer main to the wastewater transfer station.
