

Role

Subject to compliance with Council strategies, policies, plans and legislation:

- To develop relationships in community sectors to enable Council to achieve local solutions to local problems and promote positive change and sustainability for strong, healthy and safe communities.
- To develop for recommendation to the Policy Committee the plans, programmes and policies for co-ordination with other agencies including but not restricted to government, regional and community agencies to further community development outcomes.
- To work with others to share information and to connect community groups to each other where appropriate.
- To establish a strategic focus to align Council economic, cultural, social and environmental development programmes with community outcomes as set out in the Long Term Plan.
- To develop and maintain a strong relationship with Tangata Whenua by ensuring Maori values are considered.
- To maintain liaison with the relevant community boards regarding issues raised in their board areas.

Delegations:

- To monitor the work of the Community Development Team through receipt of regular reports.
- To receive community development plans and where appropriate make recommendations to Council or its Committees to assist in the implementation of the plans.
- To receive and resolve on or recommend to Council or its Committees as appropriate the reports, recommendations and minutes of any Joint Committee, working group or forum as directed by Council.
- To facilitate the involvement of external parties in achieving Council outcomes in the Long Term Plan.
- To promote and advocate on behalf of Council the co-ordination of community services and agencies for the well-being of the community.
- To advise Council and its Committees on community plans, policies and projects that impact on the achievement of Council outcomes.
- To develop and promote strategies and programmes to facilitate community participation in issues which contribute to Council strategies and outcomes.
- To monitor performance and outcomes of community halls, including development and maintenance of relationships with Community Hall Committees.

- To monitor Community Service Contracts, set service delivery requirements and receive reports from but not limited to the following:
 - Katikati Open Air Art
 - Tauranga Safer Cities
 - Tauranga Citizens Advice Bureau
 - Sport BOP
 - BOP Surf Lifesaving Waihi Beach and Maketu
 - Katikati Resource Centre

Community Grants

Subject to compliance with Council strategies, policies, plans and legislation to allocate or recommend allocation of discretionary funds in accordance with the following delegations:

- To allocate funds from the Discretionary Community Grants fund in accordance with Council's criteria and policies for the fund.
- To consider applications to the Facilities in the Community Grant Fund and make recommendations to Council through the annual plan process on such applications in accordance with Council's criteria and policies for the fund.
- To monitor the allocation of all discretionary grants made by Council and its Community Boards.

Financial Delegations

Allocation of annual budgeted funds from the Discretionary Community Grants fund.

The Committee may delegate any of its functions, duties or powers to a subcommittee subject to the restrictions on its delegations and provided that any sub-delegation to subcommittees includes a statement of purpose and specification of task.

The Committee may make recommendations to Council or its Committees on any matters to achieve the outcomes required in the role of the Committee but outside its delegated authorities.

COMMUNITY TEAM UPDATE 31 January 2019

1. Purpose

The purpose of this report is to update Elected Members on recent and future activities taking place in and around the District that may be relevant to them.

2. Activities and updates

2.1 Community Committee

- Five Community Committee meetings, and one working group meeting (Community Matching Fund) will be held this year on the following dates:
 - > 14 February
 - > 28 March
 - 9 May
 - > 20 June
 - 11 July (Working Group)
 - > 1 August.
- This year, alongside the review on Council's current Communities Strategy, we'll explore further the themes of Community Plans, Youth Engagement and Development, Community Collaboration, Ethnic/Migrant/Welcoming Communities, and Community Capacity Building and Development.
- Some key highlights will include:
 - At our first meeting of 2019, members of both the Te Puna and Omokoroa Connectors Groups have been invited to present and will give an update on where things are at with their community plans.
 - At the June meeting, the focus will be on relationship building with our community service delivery providers in a world café style conversation format (similar format to 2018).
 - At the August and last meeting of 2019, the CMF Working Group will recommend to the Committee, regarding the allocations of the matching fund.
 - Throughout the year, we'll hear first hand from past CMF recipients on where things are at with their projects.

2.2 Youth Engagement and Development

- The Community Team attended a youth engagement and development event (Rangatahi Rangona) at Katikati which took place on Tuesday 11 December.
- This event was facilitated by Noelene Te Whakaara, a past presenter at the Committee.
- The purpose of the event was to discuss the opportunities, challenges and aspirations of Katikati youth.

 The event was well attended with nearly 50 representatives from various local community groups, schools, local and central government, and not-for-profit organisations.

2.3 Community safety

- Over the summer period, community safety initiatives such as neighbourhood support, community patrols, and lifeguard services at our beaches, are adjusted to reflect the increase of people into the sub-region, and the many festive events and activities that occur during that time.
- Community Patrols in our communities receive taskings directly from Police to observe people and traffic movements in key 'hotspot' areas and or events, including our council reserves.
- Neighbourhood Support coordinators increase communication and promotion
 of crime prevention awareness, particularly in regards to holidaymakers
 leaving their homes for periods of time. Police advise that there has been a
 significant increase in burglaries, and car break ins recently.

2.4 Community matching fund

- Operationally, the Community Team has kicked off preparation for this year's funding round.
- Various teams across Council are part of the CMF staff project team including Communications, Governance, and Policy and Planning.
- The following are the key timelines for the funding round:
 - > Applications open Monday 29 April
 - Applications close Wednesday 29 May
 - Working Group meeting Thursday 11 July
 - Community Committee decision Thursday 1 August.

2.5 Natural Environment

- Bay Conservation Alliance (BCA) is emerging as a force in the environmental field in our sub region. Having started with four groups as members, they now have six. These group members include:
 - Otanewajnuku Kiwi Trust
 - Aongatete Forest Project
 - Uretara Estuary Managers
 - Maketu Ongatoro Wetland Society
 - > Te Whakakaha Trust
 - > Friends of the Blade.
- However, the support they enjoy is not just at the local level. They have been given a special mention in the Parliamentary Commissioner for the Environment's (2017) report entitled "Taonga of an Island Nation" (p.110), where they mentioned BCA as "a professional support team tasked with taking the load off volunteers so that they can get on with the practical work."
- This report recommends that BCA is a model of environmental best practice for New Zealand that should be explored further.
- In recognition of this new emphasis in national direction, the Department of Conservation's Community Conservation Fund which has \$8 million for the 2019 year will also make funds available for a trial of regional hubs.
- With Eugenie Sage the Environment Minister attending the BCA official launch on 21 September 2018, BCA are hopeful that they are well placed to deliver

one of those funded trials. This would be a wonderful achievement for BCA who now enjoy the support of our District's top environmental groups.

2.6 Welcoming Communities/Ethnic and Migrant Communities

- Since the Welcoming Plan was adopted by Joint Governance last October, Haidee Kalirai, Welcoming Communities Advisor, with advice and assistance from the Community Team, has continued progressing the Plan.
- Some key highlights include:
 - Preparing an action plan of priorities for the next two years as a result of the adoption
 - Various presentations and festivals across the sub-region including the Diwali Festival, Russian Cultural Festival and presentation to the Volunteering Bay of Plenty Board.
