

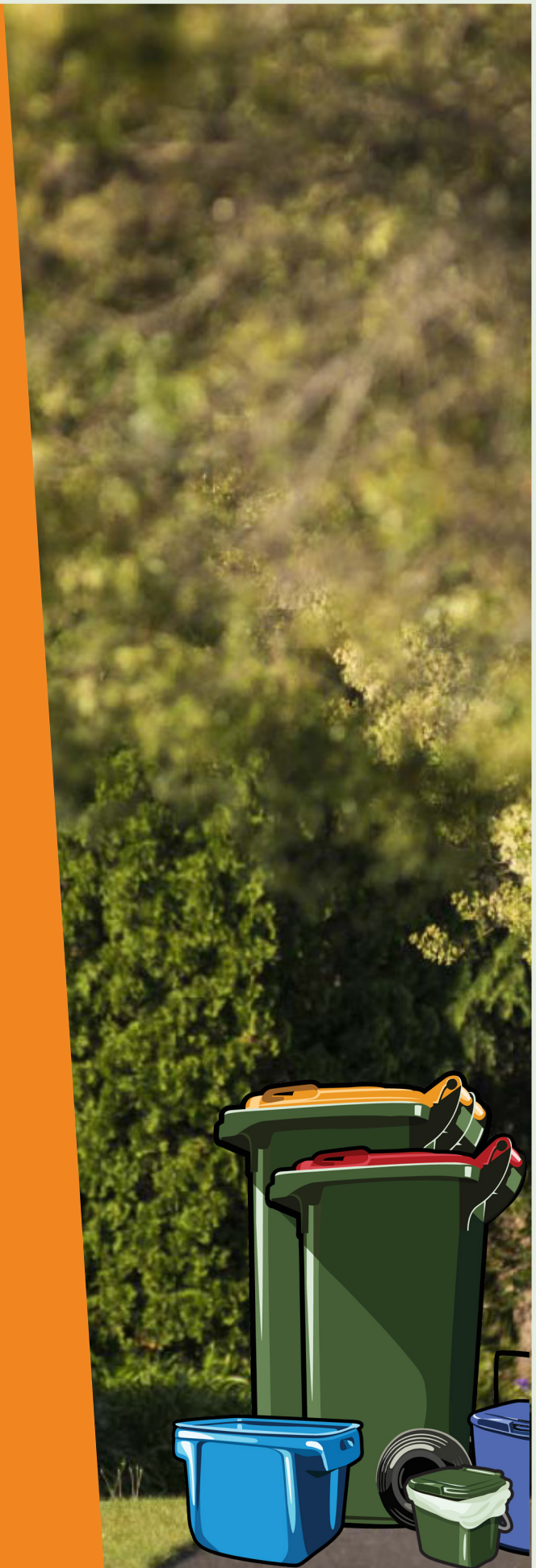

What plans does WBOPDC to implement kerbside waste services in such complexes? We see the option of giving our tenants five bins would be overwhelming. The space around the unit would be taken up with bins and could cause hazards.  In housing complexes, would WBOPDC consider centralised collection points?
